

Lobo (Coldstream) First Day School, Book 4 1931 - 1956

Archives:

This record book is held by the Canadian Quaker Archives and Library in Newmarket, Ontario. The minutes appear to end in 1956 but a few entries dated up to 1960 are present near the end of the book.

The transcription was coordinated by Jane Zavitz Bond, archivist for Canada Yearly Meeting, and fully transcribed by Sheila Havard with minor formatting changes for posting by Randy Saylor. The text was transcribed as written so researchers must consider the many variations in spelling when searching the transcribed text. Transcriber notes are in square brackets. The book has not been proof read.

This transcription was originally posted on the Canadian Yearly Meeting Archives web site. By agreement, it is now posted on the Canadian Friends Historical Association (CFHA) web site. It is made freely available and supports search, cut and paste. CFHA will officially grant linking privileges to organizations that support this free access. CFHA wishes to express its gratitude to those who worked on this project.

Lobo Township is in Middlesex County and situated a few miles west of London, Ontario. The township was settled around 1834 in part by Quakers from the Pelham area and directly from Pennsylvania. In 1849 the growing Quaker community was granted indulged status by Norwich Monthly Meeting. In 1850 the first meeting house was built. Soon the meeting house was no longer adequate and was replaced by the current brick meeting house in 1859 at the small village of Coldstream. In 1857 the meeting became a Preparative Meeting under Norwich Monthly Meeting and this minute book starts at that time. Arthur Dorland in his *A History of the Society of Friends (Quakers) in Canada*, 1927 & 1968, states that Lobo Meeting became one of the most progressive centres of the Hicksite Branch of Friends in Canada [172].

In 1893, since Lobo was the most active meeting within the Monthly Meeting it was decided that the name of Norwich Monthly Meeting should be changed to Lobo Monthly Meeting [Dorland, 172]. According to Jane Zavitz Bond, in the 1980's Lobo Monthly Meeting became Coldstream Monthly Meeting and Yarmouth was set off as Yarmouth Monthly Meeting at Sparta. Coldstream is still an active meeting and Coldstream Friends Meeting has a website at coldstreamquakers.com.

The subject of giving Bibles to all the children as they arrive at the age of ten or eleven was brought up again and all were favourable so Florence B. Bycraft and Helen Zavitz were appointed to look over list and get for those of specified age.

The Supt. and teachers are appointed as a Com. to prepare special programs for special days.

The children of Intermediate class enjoy their paper "What To Do", so it was decided to send for it for another year.

Elis Cutler is appointed to attend the Executive of S.S. Association and pay as usual our fee of two dollars.

Then adjourned

A special program was given at Easter Sun. The whole school met in one class for the lesson which was led by George Bycraft. The children had recitations, and music by school. Two Bibles were presented one to Leon Hamacher and the other to Neil McArthur.

The children all received a package of seeds or bulbs to plant with the following verse written on each envelope.

The Com. appointed a year ago to have charge of the First-day School submit the following report.

School has been conducted each week throughout the year with 57 members on the roll and an average attendance of 32. During five months, beginning with Dec. it was held in afternoon and rest of year at ten o'clock in morning.

The school is divided into five classes. Adult, Young Peoples and three divisions for the children and there are six on the cradle roll.

Instead of a Christmas entertainment a chicken and oyster supper was given for our own members in Community Hall during Christmas week.

A special program was given at Easter which consisted of recitations by the children, music, and all met in one class for the lesson with George Bycraft as teacher.

Two Bibles were presented this year one to Leon Hamacher and one to Neil McArthur. All of the children were given a pkt. of seeds or bulbs to plant with the following verse written on each envelope.

New Easter joy you will know.”

The Sabeth School Convention met here the 19th. of May, it was well attended and both sessions were very interesting. Supper was served to all in the Community Hall. Our usual fee of \$2. was paid to Secretary of Convention.

Five copies of “What To Do” are taken for Intermediate Class.

The Missionary Supt. has two dollars and sixty cents collected in mite boxes.

We recommend a committee be appointed as usual to have charge of the school the coming year.

The Com. met in meeting house after meeting to make arrangements for a Christmas entertainment. It was decided to have one the night of 21st. of Dec. and we appoint Florence B. Bycraft, Marguerite Zavitz Lettie McArthur and Violet Hocking to look after the childrens part of program. and George Bycraft Florence A Bycraft, Beatrice Brown and Ronald Cutler as a com. to get up a play, dialogue and drill.

Archie Hocking and Louis Muma have charge of music.

Mary Muma and Violet Hocking are appointed to get the things and make up the Christmas stockings one for each of the children.

A letter was recieved from Ida Graham Sec't of S.S. Convention telling us of the arrangement made about the banner to improve the attendance in Sunday Schools. They also recommended that each S.S. adopt the plan of having the Robert Raikes Diploma. This was discussed quite a lot and thought it was best to find out what was the basis for membership in other schools. The secretary is asked to procure this information.

Florence B. Bycraft and Helen Zavitz are appointed to get Bibles for the children who have arrived at their tenth year.

Then adjourned.

Three Bibles were presented one to Betty Zavitz, one to Anita Hocking and another to Allen Zavitz. A Christmas stocking was given to each of the children. the expenses were \$2.55 for Bibles and stockings \$2.10. leaving a balance of \$5.95.

The sect. attended the S.S. Executive and reported. We were asked to send our usual subscription of two dollars direct to Religious Educational Council in Toronto instead of through the S.S. Association.
